

RCLS Board Talking Points

At its Monday, May 21 meeting, the RCLS Board of Trustees had the following Talking Points:



- Discussed the upcoming workshops on prevailing wage and eligible construction projects held on May 22 and May 23.
- Rosemary Cooper, Directors Association Representative reported the Fine Free children's and young adult materials trial will start September 1. She also discussed refocusing our advocacy approach and shifting not only locally, but state wide.
- Discussed the retirement of State Senators William J. Larkin, Jr. and John J. Bonacic. The Board is thankful for their library advocacy over the years.
- The Plan of Service Survey participation increased this year over the previous years. The answers gave valuable feedback from the member libraries that responded.

The Talking Points will be elaborated on in the Minutes of the May Board meeting, which will be posted to the <u>RCLS website</u> about a week before the next regular meeting on Monday, June 18 at RCLS. What's Next for Net Neutrality?

Ellen Satterwhite writes, "With the passage of <u>net neutrality</u> in the Senate on May 16, action moves to the House, which must also vote. We hope the House will follow the Senate's lead and

pass this resolution quickly to undo the FCC's reckless and unpopular action. Already, 160 members of the House have signed on, and we expect more to follow in the coming days. You



can help by continuing to tell your members of Congress (or thanking them) that net neutrality is critical to the modern library and our communities through our action alert." But even if the resolution fails in the House, some think that net neutrality protections will soon be "the law of the land again—this time for good."

In partnership with and in support of Summer Reading at New York Libraries, <u>myON</u> will be providing free, unlimited 24/7 access to myON's Digital Library and Middle School Classics for children from Birth through Grade 8. Access will be available from May through September 2018 more than 6,000 fiction and non-fiction eBooks for students and families with young children through both their schools and public libraries.

Students that already have a myON login will continue to use that login to access the myON digital library and continue reading throughout the summer.
