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State Law Requires Public Library Trustee to Take Oath of Office

Many library trustee terms begin on July 1. This is an important reminder that New York State Public Officer's Law <u>\$10</u> requires all public library trustees (but not association library trustees) to take an oath of office within 30

days of beginning their term of office. Public library trustees are public officers and the oath of office is required to officially undertake and perform the duties of a public library trustee.

If a public library trustee does not properly complete and file an oath of office, the trustee's position may be deemed vacant. See Public Officer's Law \$30(1)(h).

Webinar—Beyond Surveys: How to Measure Outcomes Using Alternative Data Collection Methods

Wednesday, July 18 from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Outcome measurement is a way for libraries to assess their impact on the people they serve and helps libraries answer the question, "What good did we do?" With a vast number of ways to collect outcomes, it may be overwhelming to identify which data collection methods to use. Choosing the methodology also depends on the library's learning goals, time limitations, staff capacity and more. This FREE webinar is designed to help libraries learn what methods are available to them, and the benefits and challenges to each. This webinar will highlight several methods, with an emphasis on focus groups.

Stephen Dark <u>writes</u>, "Men and women in 35 prisons and jails in 13 states nationwide depend on Toby Lafferty

(right) and her Millcreek, Utah -based nonprofit, <u>Books Inside</u>, for a monthly supply of books to expand often decrepit libraries. In 2017, Books Inside mailed 23,000 books to



incarceration facilities. In Utah alone, she supplies seven jails and created libraries from nothing in the Tooele County and Kane County jails. Lafferty's experience reveals the impact books can have on both the inmates and the staff who watch over them.


Library Marketer of the Year Award
