A new edition of the Handbook for Library Trustees of New York State is now available online for free through the New York State Library's website. Print copies will soon be available through RCLS.

Updates include:

 Alignment of information with the newly revised Minimum Standards for Public Libraries in NYS;



- Clarity on the questions surrounding the Library Treasurer and Library District Clerk positions;
- Expanded commentary on procurement policies and the "claims audit" procedure, a very hot topic in recent audits of public libraries by the Office of the State Comptroller;
- New information about the position of the Library Director as an "Officer of the Corporation" and the suggestion that the Library Director take the Oath of Office, just as public library trustees do;
- Connections to the work of the Sustainability Initiative of the New York Library Association; and
- Links to several brand-new webinars that will help trustees do their job as a trustee.

ALA Accepting Scholarship Applications

Office for Human Resource Development and Recruitment, Sept. 18

If you need financial assistance to get through your graduate program, scholarship funds are now available. ALA has more than \$300,000 available to students who are studying in library science or school library media programs at the master's degree level. The deadline to apply is **Thursday**, **March 7**, **2019**. Scholarships range from \$1,500 to \$7,000 per student per year. They include scholarships for students who are interested in children's, youth, and federal librarianship, as well as new media and library automation. Scholarships are available for minorities, persons with disabilities, and people who are already employed in libraries but do not have an MLS.

Humanities New York Grants

Humanities New York awards grants to tax-exempt organizations that use the humanities to foster engaged inquiry and dialogue around social and cultural concerns. They encourage innovative approaches in the design and delivery of public-facing programming. There are three competitive grant opportunities: Vision (\$1,500), Action (\$5,000) and Quick (\$500).

They prioritize support to projects that reach audiences with fewer opportunities to attend cultural programming. Because Humanities New York is a statewide organization, within each grant round they strive to make awards in as many regions of the state as possible. Through 2020, requests related to the U.S. Women's Suffrage Centennial are welcome. Other priorities include supporting small and rural organizations.

Library of Congress, Sept. 26

The Library of Congress announced September 26 that it has digitized hundreds of hours of motion pictures that will be freely available on the newly launched <u>National Screening Room website</u>. Most of the content in the National Screening Room is in the public domain and is fully downloadable. Permissions were granted for the inclusion of copyrighted motion pictures, which are only available as streaming files. The first phase of the project features 281 titles; new content will be added every month.
