
Library Certification

<u>Grace Riario</u>, RCLS Assistant Director and Outreach Coordinator

A reminder that public Librarian Professional Certificates issued as of January 1, 2010, and thereafter shall only remain valid when 60 hours of professional development are

completed during a five-year period (defined as every five years from the date the certificate is issued).

Approved programs from accepted providers include: courses, workshops, seminars, lectures, webinars, e-courses, library conference programs, or other relevant programs. As



stipulated in Commissioner's Regulation § 90.7(c)(1), curriculum from "any other institution or provider as preapproved by the employing library, employing library system or the State Education Department" can fulfill the professional development requirement.

What records to keep:

- Certificates or transcripts showing successful completion of courses.
- Letters from a supervisor indicating completion of a program or project.
- For webinars you attend, keep both the e-mail you receive when you register as well as the e-mail you receive after the event.

Each program attendee is allowed, once a year, to request a summary listing of the RCLS Continuing Education programs that they have attended from Ruth Daubenspeck (ruth@rcls.org).

NEH Preservation Grants for Smaller Institutions

Preservation Assistance Grants, awarded by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), help small and mid-sized institutions, such as libraries, historical societies, and archival repositories, improve their ability to preserve and care for their significant humanities collections. These may include special collections of books and journals, archives and manuscripts, prints and photographs, moving images, sound recordings, architectural and cartographic records, decorative and fine art objects, textiles, archaeological and ethnographic artifacts, furniture, historical objects, and digital materials. The maximum award amount is \$10,000 (\$15,000 for projects related to the 250th anniversary of American independence).

Eight Ways for Small Libraries to Save Money on Programs

Programming Librarian, Nov. 15 Chelsea Price writes, "Meservey, Iowa, is a tiny, rural town of just 240 people. We have a church, a bar, a post office, and my little library. There isn't much to do in town as far as entertainment goes, so the library tends to serve as a community hub—we are one of the only local sources of free events and programs. As you might imagine, our programming budget is quite small. I'm very limited on what I'm financially able to do, as there's not much wiggle room for pricey performers or large events. But during my four years as director, I've found ways to get a lot of bang for my programming buck. Here are a few things I've learned."
