RCLS Trustee Nominations Four Candidates Sought to Fill RCLS Board of Trustee Seats

The election of four RCLS Trustees will be an item of business at the Ramapo Catskill Library System's Annual Meeting on Friday, September 13. RCLS is governed by an eleven-member board, four Trustees each from Orange and

Rockland counties, two Trustees from Sullivan County and one Trustee from Ulster County.

Anyone, other than a salaried employee of the System or any RCLS member libraries, is eligible for election or appointment as a



voting member of the System Board of Trustees. Potential trustees must reside in the county, which such trustee represents.

A term on the RCLS Board is five (5) years. A Trustee may serve any number of terms as long as not more than two (2) are consecutive. The Orange, Rockland and Sullivan seats are to fill expired terms. The new terms will end December 31, 2024. The Ulster seat is to fill a partial term that will end December 31, 2023.

Potential candidates must be nominated by a member library board in the county where they reside. The library must send documentation (i.e. board meeting minutes) of their nomination to RCLS, attention Carla Randazzo Amthor, RCLS Board Secretary or email to <u>ruth@rcls.org</u>.

Trustees of at least one other member library in the same county must second the nomination. They must also send documentation (i.e. board meeting minutes) to RCLS, attention Carla Randazzo Amthor, RCLS Board Secretary or email to ruth@rcls.org.

All documentation must arrive at RCLS at least 30 days (Wednesday, August 14) prior to the Annual Meeting.

Submit a biography of yourself, not to exceed 250 words, to be included in the *RCLS Weekly Memo* and the Legislative Breakfast & Annual Meeting Program to Ruth Daubenspeck at RCLS by **Wednesday, August 14**. The biography can cover whatever you wish to express, but should stress previous library and/or community service. This biography is the only means that you have to present yourself to fellow trustees.

On Sunday, May 5, the Cornwall Public Library had a very popular and unusual program at the town's Senior Center, Munger Cottage. The program was titled, "Flamenco Music, Song and Dance." More than 135 people attended, some from several surrounding towns, to learn about the flamenco guitar, the culture of flamenco song, and the arm movements and use of castanets in flamenco dance. Greg Melnick (guitar), Mario Rincon (vocals) and Juana Cala (dance), were very professional in their performance, and engaging with the audience for a question and answer segment at the end. This was a grant-funded program by Arts Mid-Hudson, so surveys were distributed. All the surveys rated the program as excellent.

Book snakes are designed to hold open books, freeing up a researcher's hands to take notes, take a picture, or hold a magnifying glass. They come in three basic weights."
